There are some historical inaccuracies in *Selma*, e.g., the depiction of President Johnson as a reluctant supporter of civil rights, and the lack of representation of the historically accurate support of Jewish leadership for the civils rights movement. However, overall, *Selma* is considered to be highly historically accurate.)
- <u>When They See Us</u>, created, co-written, and directed by Ava DuVernay. (Note: The events depicted are real, although some of the specifics, e.g., private conversations, are considered to have been written with artistic license.)
