It is worth noting that Hispanic refers to Spanish-speaking people from Spanish-speaking countries, while LatinX typically refers to individuals from Latin America (e.g., Mexico, Central America, South America, Caribbean). The term "LatinX" is used as a gender-neutral or nonbinary alternative to Latino or Latina. The Hispanic and LatinX communities are diverse and complex in history and culture. Experiences with racism and xenophobia, mental health stigma, language barriers, access to care, and transgenerational trauma are just a few pieces of the cultural awareness puzzle.
