#### June 2021 Resources: Racial Health Inequities

Racial inequity in health care has been an ongoing problem in our country. These inequities include pervasively poorer health outcomes within historically marginalized communities, fewer providers in racially segregated/low income neighborhoods, a lower proportion of diverse providers, biased assumptions by providers treating racial minorities, inadequate attention to the stressor of racism and its effects on health, and inadequate health insurance coverage for part-time, service, and minimum wage jobs disproportionately employing BIPOC individuals. The current COVID-19 pandemic has made these inequities even more apparent with disproportionately high rates of infection, hospitalization, and death as well as lower rates of vaccination.

Dr. Jennifer Kelly, the current president of APA, has highlighted the role of psychology in addressing racial health inequities in the launch of a Presidential Task Force on Psychology and Health Equity to "produce a comprehensive report articulating a vision for the role of psychology in advancing health equity." The goal of that task force is to "gather input from health care experts and the available scientific literature in order to make recommendations for psychological science, education and training, practice, public policy and legislative advocacy." <u>APA 2021 president's health</u> equity initiative
